LOGLINE:

The filmmaker receives the letter unopened by her Indian father for 20 years, to discover why her interracial family was banished. Three generations, three continents, one family.

SYNOPSIS (long)

TERRIBLE CHILDREN is sparked by a family letter unopened for decades. The filmmaker discovers the events that led to her father's banishment from his Indian family after marrying her Danish mother. This compelling journey reveals her parents' memories during the same decade: Muslim-Hindu riots during India's Partition, boyhood training in a paramilitary group, and Denmark during Nazi-occupation. Dreamlike images and searing archival footage reveal unexpected parallels of war based on racial purity, and the transformative power of love.

SYNOPSIS (short)

The filmmaker discovers a story about her father from a letter that remained unopened for 20 years. She tells her father's lyrical nightmares and archival dreams about religious war, love, and redemption across India, Denmark, USA and Canada.

SHANTI THAKUR – PRODUCER, DIRECTOR, WRITER, EDITOR

Born in Canada, Shanti Thakur is an award-winning filmmaker who has worked in New York City for twenty years. Her work is recognized for visually lush fiction and documentary films that span a landscape of subjects from science fiction to restorative justice. Shanti's films have screened at over 200 international film festivals and museums including the Cannes Film Festival, Montreal World Film Festival, Edinburgh Film Festival, and the Museum of Modern Art in New York. Shanti's short fiction film SKY PEOPLE was considered for an Academy Award nomination.

Crossing various genres, RED TULIPS, A STORY ABOUT FORGETTING, SKY PEOPLE, KAIROS, SEVEN HOURS TO BURN, TWO FORMS, CIRCLES and DOMINO have won 30 awards and have broadcast in 22 countries. Working as director, writer, editor and producer on her films, Shanti has received support from the National Film Board of Canada, the Pennsylvania Council of the Arts, the Independent Film Project (IFP) and the Pew Fellowship in the Arts. She is a Professor and the Director of the School of Film and Animation at the Rochester Institute of Technology. www.shantithakur.com

MARK LIPSON – EXECUTIVE PRODUCER

MARK LIPSON attended NYU Film School and came to Los Angeles to pursue photography and film/television producing. He developed and associate produced the original CHILDREN OF THE CORN feature and produced ALMOST YOU, an indiecomedy for Fox Classics. In the mid-90's he supervised three innovative documentary series for ITVS, including THE UNITED STATES OF POETRY. Later, while shooting stills for David Byrne's film TRUE STORIES, he met Errol Morris and went on to produce three of Errol's films: the award winning THE THIN BLUE LINE, then FAST CHEAP AND OUT OF CONTROL and most recently, TABLOID.

Mark has executive produced and post-supervised numerous independent features such as STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURE, COUNTDOWN TO ZERO, THIS SPACE AVAILABLE, THE SOURCE FAMILY MOVIE, RED ARMY, the Emmy Award winning IN FOOTBALL WE TRUST and THE JUDGE. His current projects include BOGALUSA CHARM, SOCIAL ANIMALS, JOY BUBBLES AND BELLY OF THE BEAST.

BENJAMIN WOLF – CINEMATOGRAPHER

From the Emmy award winning PBS series SLAVERY AND THE MAKING OF AMERICA, to the Peabody award winning series NIMROD NATION to the Academy Award considered short film SKY PEOPLE, Benjamin has brought a successful combination of skill, creativity, and collaboration to his work as a Director of Photography and Director. Upon graduating from the Newhouse School of Public Communications at Syracuse University, he began his career on

the highly successful PBS series WEST VIRGINIA. After moving to New York City in the late 1990's, Benjamin continued working in non-fiction with films such as AFRICAN AMERICAN LIVES and LOSING IT while also expanding into more narrative and commercial projects. Now based in Colorado and with over a dozen award winning features and shorts to his credit, such as PATER FAMILIAS, TALKING TO STAN, and IT'S ABOUT UGLINESS Benjamin easily moves between film and television, narrative and documentary, directing and cinematography.

QUENTIN CHIAPPETTA - SOUND DESIGNER, MUSICIAN

Quentin is an award-winning, classically trained composer and sound designer with years of experience scoring for every type of media, from television and film, to theater and VR. Quentin's music for television is heard in hundreds of series, including the hit show THE FIRST 48. He has composed scores for dozens of independent feature films and documentaries, and designed and mixed the sound for hundreds, many of which have premiered at film festivals around the world, including Sundance, Cannes, Berlin, and the Tribeca Film Festival. His recent work includes the documentary short COLLETTE which won an Oscar in 2021, the Netflix series DAUGHTERS OF DESTINY, the original score and sound work for the documentary REACHING WEST on public television.

Quentin is a sought-after collaborator for ground-breaking video installations, including the legendary Tony Conrad, Zeena Parkins, Kim Sooja, and Christian Marclay. Quentin's 20-year creative relationship with Marclay culminated in THE CLOCK, the groundbreaking winner of the 2012 Venice Biennale for which he was the sound designer and mixer, www.medianoise.com

Kairos: Greek for the transformative moment. A woman must choose between two contradictory lovers, two kinds of happiness.

SEVEN HOURS TO BURN

1999, 9 minutes, US, experimental-documentary

The filmmaker explores her Danish mother's and Indian father's experiences of two

different wars based on religious and ethnic purity. Ghostly war footage is intercut with ethereal body-scapes and rich, impressionistic imagery.

TWO FORMS

1998, 4 minutes, US, experimental Director, Cinematographer, Editor: Shanti Thakur Two Forms is a sensual and meditative study of two interlocking hands, ambiguous in gender. Black and white extreme close-ups suggest other corporeal forms and textures, reminiscent of the photography of Weston.

CROSSING BORDERS

1992, 25 minutes, Canada, documentary Producer, Director, Writer: Shanti Thakur Follows the murder of a white woman in a mixed community in Montreal. Video was used as a tool to build dialogue between the Black community center and their white neighbors.

DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT

My 86-year-old father handed me a crinkled blue letter and said quietly, "Maybe you can do something with this." This is the letter his father sent him from India...which was left unopened for 20 years after his father's death.

This is the beginning of the story.

Of race and masculinity, of love and betrayal, and finally, of transformation.

My father began to share stories of intergenerational trauma, colonization, coming-of-age, and creating a surrogate family. As a director, I wanted to steer away from the earnest, sociological portraits of non-Western people so often seen in documentaries. Instead, I created a cinematic style to bring his story to life, and to build his internal landscape.

Memory is like poetry. Facts and dates are un-moveable. But the way we create metaphor and dreams in our lives is an act of survival.

The goal is to represent the 'un-representable' through beautifully woven vignettes and creative reenactments contoured by archival footage. My use of poetic voice-over is the continuum that bridges three generations, three continents and three cultures.
